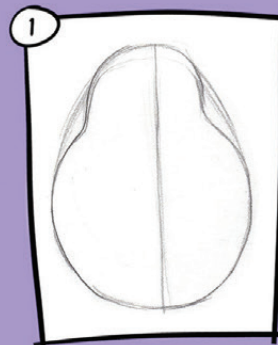
Basic Party Caricature Sketching

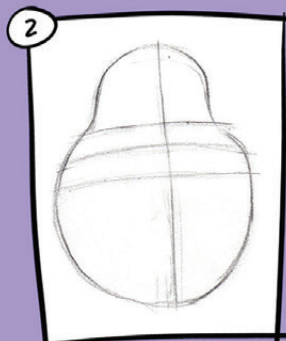
Here's John,
let's draw him!



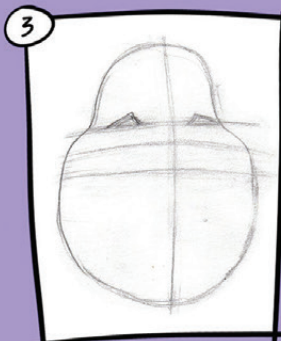
Let's start with a rough pencil sketch of the head and draw some light pencil guidelines as shown below. We'll pencil in the eyes, nose, mouth, chin, eyebrows, ears, hair, and other details.



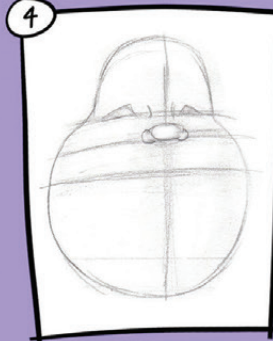
1 Draw an oval, refine as a pear shape, make a light line down the middle.



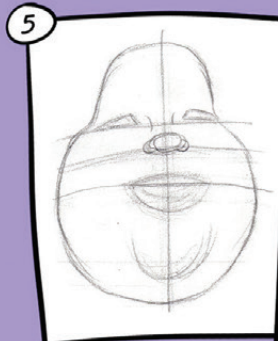
2 Draw guidelines across where the eyes, nose, and mouth will be drawn.



3 Draw the shape of the eyes and notice the distance between them.



4 Draw the nose and two lines between the eyes that will represent the bridge of the nose.



5 Draw the mouth and chin shape.



Have fun with it! Feel free to try slightly different ways of placing the features on the face. Remember that you base this on the impression you have of your subject.

Think, "what do I notice first? What are the shapes I see? Is it a round, long, or pear-shaped face? What are the shapes of the features? How close or far are they from one another? Should I exaggerate a little more or less...what looks best?"

For inking, use a marker. I like the indelible black markers with medium nib or a brush tip. You can also use a dark pencil.

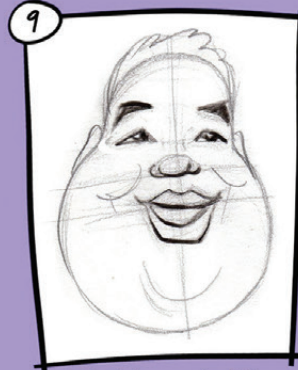
6 Draw the ears, brows, cheek lines, and hair



7 Ink in the eyes and nose.



8 Ink in the mouth



9 Ink in the brows and eyeballs.



10 Ink in the chin, cheeks, head, and ears.



11 Ink hair, teeth, bridge of nose, and five o'clock shadow.

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
